

# 2001 Michigan Traffic Crash FACT SHEET



In a crash, motorcyclists lack the protection of an enclosed vehicle.



The 2001 death rate for motorcyclists was 15.6 per 100 million vehicle miles traveled compared to the overall mileage death rate of 1.4 per 100 million vehicle miles traveled.



Injuries to motorcyclists were proportionately more severe than injuries to persons in other motor vehicles.



There were 3,228 motorcycle-involved crashes in which 90 motorcyclists were killed and 2,593 injured.



Motorcycles were involved in 0.81 percent of all traffic crashes in Michigan in 2001.



Because motorcycles have a low profile, they tend to be less visible than other motor vehicles. 69 (76.7%) of the 90 motorcyclists killed were reported by police as "going straight ahead" just prior to crash.



Of the motorcyclists killed in traffic crashes in 2001, 90.0 percent were male.



Of the motorcyclists killed in 2001, 28 deaths were the result of a had-been-drinking crash and 24 (85.7%) of these motorcyclists had been drinking.



Of the male motorcyclists injured, 531 (24.1%) were 25 - 34 years old.
